





So join Steve, Jen, Jackson and the crew from Adventure Moto and Tyres 4 Bikes for a "FANTASTIC" Dirty Weekend.

*A ride route will be provided on a printed route sheet or GPX file.

Support will be limited to a follow through with a support vehicle following the ride one hour after the last rider leaves the ride-start. All Riders are responsible for their own luggage and bikes being trail worthy. There will be no zero or sweep riders on the supplied route.

CORNER MARKING

Many rides will utilise corner marking.

- The Ride Leader will indicate, by pointing, a safe location where he/she would like the rider directly behind him/ her to mark a corner.
- The corner marker should stop in a safe place that is visible to following riders, indicate with the turn signal to
 following riders the route and remain in position until Tail End Charlie indicates to re-join the ride. Re-join
 the ride safely.
- If there are inexperienced riders the corner marker may need to wait for a while but remember other riders' enjoyment is dependent on your effort.
- Corner marking is utilised to allow a ride to progress in an orderly and systematic way regardless of factors that could cause a disrupted ride.
- Some of these factors include the following.
- A wide range of rider experience that would cause frustration to more experienced riders by frequently stopping to allow slower riders to catch up.
- Traffic conditions, e.g. frequent traffic lights, or congestion, that cause the ride to break up into groups that lose touch with one another.
- Some riders who just want to "amble" along having a leisurely ride while others go ahead.
- More often than not, especially on mid-week rides, the ride leader will decide that ride members have similar
 experience and ability and so corner marking can be dispensed with. This means that the ride leader needs to be
 able to see following riders in his/her mirrors and may prevent the ride breaking up by introducing occasional
 stops.

THE RIDE GUIDE

Our branch rides are all about the journey and sharing experiences and fellowship with branch riders and visitors. We should be aware of the varying experience of riders on the day and make allowances for that. In appreciation of the range of bikes and the range of rider experience we ask that each rider to do the following.

- Arrive with a full tank of fuel and an empty bladder.
- Complete the Ride Register, it is for your own safety
- Listen to the briefing by the Ride Leader.
- Know who Tail End Charlie is and what bike they are riding.
- Keep a safe distance at all times the 3 second rule is a good guide.
- Ride responsibly, obey road rules and ride at the pace that matches your own ability and skill level.
- Do not pass the Ride Leader unless the ride leader has indicated that this is acceptable. If you do pass without approval you are on your own.
- Overtake only in a different lane.
- if you leave the ride notify the Tail End Charlie and/or The Ride Leader (preferably both); and

If a visitor or new member make sure that the Ride Leader and Tail End Charlie are aware of the bike you are riding and your riding experience and ability.

BMW Motorrad celebrates 100 years of success.

The major anniversary exhibition at the BMW Museum opened its doors in May and visitors will be able to embark on an exciting journey through 100 years of BMW Motorrad history over the exhibition's approximately year-long run.

The Museum, built in 1973, will be displaying more than 55 original motorcycles from 10 decades in its world-famous Museumsschüssel (Museum Bowl).

The exhibition also displays tanks, benches, lights, rider's helmets, frames and smaller technical details to trace the lines of development and advertising as well as the fascinating world experienced by two globetrotters on their BMW motorcycles.

There will also be motorcycle pairings from the past to the present. In the Motorsport section, two machines are presented that are associated with victory in the legendary Tourist Trophy on the Isle of Man. Schorsch Meier was successful on his BMW R 255 Kompressor, and 75 years later Michael Dunlop placed first on a BMW S 1000 RR

The anniversary exhibition honours the drivers, designers and developers from 100 years of BMW Motorrad history and also references fascinating production in the BMW Group plant in Berlin-Spandau.



How to do 40+ Alpine Passes or Memorable Roads in 10 days.

From the Travelling Industrial Agent

Where to start and how not sound like a paid advertisement. Normally I would write the ride story up at the end, but the 4 other riders and I are overwhelmed by the winding roads we are on and the scenery we are part of.

I am writing this part on Sunday a rest day for us in Lake Como, we had the option of a ride or go by yourself, but here I am sitting on a terrace overlooking the lake and all the "pretty people" as they promenade past. The sports cars are also out, but I suspect they are out every day that the short skirts are walking around.

I have never thought I would say that I need a break in the rides and this is our second one, the first was at Chamonix and we went up the ridiculously fast and steep Gondola to get a close look at Mt Blanc.

The weather has a big bearing on a person's perception of the ride, so coming back and doing this again on a day when it's not clear blue skies may give a different impression, but so far we have 11/10 days.

Taking a break from the ride reminds me that music is as much about the pause between the notes as the notes themself.....where did the philosophical view come from?

When the trip organised by Alan and Bridget from Throw Your Leg Over (TYLO) first came up, I had no high expectations, just a chance to ride some amazing roads and Alps with others who have done the research and organising, delegation in its most effective form. I usually prefer to not have a daily destination in Australia and decide at a T intersection if left or right. Here, that would mean you could (and would) miss some amazing routes over high alpine passes and through quaint little villages where the single width road bends to avoid the corner of the existing house from hundreds of year ago.

Alan and Bridget teamed up with Adriatic Motor Tours to provide the logistics, no doubt buying power and also supply the all-important ride leader (Luka) and in this case Jure as support vehicle and general concierge.

Little did we know that these two originally from Slovenia are also philosophers, comedians and very knowledgeable general tour guides (of the type you get on a coach tour). Many a time Luka has us clambering up some steep path above the pass we have already ridden to get a better view or explain some important fact. Jure then reminds us that what we are seeing or experiencing is nothing compared to what we will see or do in Slovenia. Apparently Slovenia is the centre of the world and everything good in it and we look forward to seeing it.

The various days of riding have blurred into one, we can't separate which day we did a certain pass and some days we are doing 3-4 and all around the height or higher than Mt Kosciusko. The first day out of Freising just blew our minds as I can't think of any road in Australia that was as nice, little did we know that was only the warm up and probably if we had done it in the reverse direction, that day of riding would have been a letdown compared to what we have ridden since.....and we are still to get to Slovenia.

Having a knowledgeable local ride leader means you only need to keep him in sight and you know where you should be going, it also means by following him, you are more likely to stay on the correct side of the road, even at roundabouts.

A typical ride up to the top of a pass is about 25-30 minutes, not all corners are hairpins, but most are, so imagine that one tight hairpin on the way up to Bellthorpe (you know the one) and do that many many times on the way up and then much the same on the way down.

On these road surfaces my cornering speed has improved, but I doubt I have the same faith in our bitumen at home, I also trust these crazy car drivers and cyclists to be more consistent and predictable than ours.

If you are ever considering buying a second hand car from Europe, get an Italian one, they have not unwrapped the blinker stalk from new, either that or they ran out of blinker fluid on the assembly line.

Somehow it all just flows when you get back into the larger towns.

This tour is longer than Adriatic normally do, but Alan and Bridget wanted to add in some of their favourite rides and Adriatic has just made it work

The quality and location of the accommodation is very good and unlike many rooms I have stayed at in Europe, you don't need to leave your room to change your mind. It's a small thing, but even the bathrooms are of a large size.

Every afternoon, our Legend, Jure is waiting at our destination to flag us in or stop traffic, then out comes a cold beer or soft drink. We just park the bikes and he sorts them out, so the next day the bikes are turned around and wiped down if they got wet during the night. Our bags have been delivered to our respective rooms and he hands out our room key.

That night dinner is part of the tour and we are given a small taste of what to expect the next day, breakfast done and on the bikes by 8:15 usually, this is after Luka has explained on a map we can't really read in detail where we are going. Even here Jure is an invaluable contributor to the process as he makes sure to hold the map you the right way. Jure then collects our bags, squares things up and we ride off to meet him again later that day. Of course we then repeat that another 12 days.

Having a ride leader/tour guide along means we don't miss what may be going on in the area. The first weekend of the tour had some local wine and food tastings down along the terraces overlooking Lake Como, it would have been discourteous not to support the local region. It was also been suggested that we take the 3:23pm ferry cruise to Bellagio, walk around a couple of hours then catch the 7:20 one back, it's a 2 hour trip each way and we can then do property inspections from the waterside, which is the more appealing side as you can see very little from the streets.

Luka did try and get George Clooney to invite us in for a Nespresso, but he was busy working on a movie about people having the time of their life, he could have saved the trouble and just ridden with us on this trip and run a GoPro, of course movie goers may have thought it was too much a fantasy to be believable.

End of week 2

And just like that 10 days of riding in fabulous areas over 13 days of adventure was over, but I have the videos to now edit and relive....I am sure the family can't wait. The Grossglockner Pass was our last pass for the trip and was an excellent finale to a trip that exceeded all expectations. It is arguably the best bike riding road I have ever done for majestic views, tall mountains and lovely sweeping corners. Even though we were in a Germanic area, I found the Italian approach to overtaking more effective, but will aim to forget those skills as I don't think Australian drivers or the conditions are suited to the way they ride.

The original hook that got me onto the ride was riding the Alps, but this trip was much much more than that. The Alps were great to see and ride, but the standouts were the Dolomites (part of the Alps) and Slovenia, which I knew embarrassingly little about, only that it used to be part of Yugoslavia and the history that has always confused this rider.

There is talk of another ride next year that would spend more time in Slovenia and also do many of the areas that we also did. If they start from Lubiana, then they pick up some time lost in transits from Munich etc.

On our last morning in Lienz, we came across another group ride organised by Edelweiss, they are probably the leader in bike touring, but I preferred the less Germanic way our ride leaders shepherded us with kid gloves and we were still there on time and more importantly in the right town where Jure would meet us every afternoon with a cold beer or soft drinks before handing out our room keys. He had already delivered our luggage to our respective rooms. On the Edelweiss tour, we met Bob from Baltimore, he was on his 20th riding tour and still loving it. This of course got me thinking about how we can sometimes create self limiting beliefs about what is possible.

Sitting now in a cafe after visiting the BMW Museum today and reflecting on the highlights that I can vividly recall

The first pass (Kesselberg pass) it seemed so special at the time (maybe like a first love) and set the tone for the next 10 riding days.

Overnighting on the Grimsell Pass and looking out in both directions to see the roads switchbacking below us as the late daylight faded.

The added bonus ride up to a dam off to the side of the Grimmsell pass, this broke us in as it were on how guardrails were for wimps and how steep the drop off could be if you didn't stick to your line. As an added privilege the Swiss Airforce must have got a new budget allowance as high above us, we could hear fast fighter jets flying around, it was only when they released the anti missile "chaff" from their aircraft that we could spot the smoke. The Grimsell then almost immediately joins the Furka Pass and of course was seen in a James Bond movie, unfortunately the Belvedere Hotel is now closed and is in serious decay.

The weather played a huge factor in our enjoyment and choice of roads, except for one day of early morning rain (storms really) we had perfect weather. This allowed for another added bonus, Alan from TYLO was keen for us to ride up the highest road in Slovenia, this road to Mangart is often very crowed and is a return trip as it can not cross to the other side. The weather was questionable until we got close and then we were up there in probably the only 1 hour weather window that existed for that week. This meant many people had stayed away so when we got to the top, there was only 5 other cars there. Looking down at the valley and the winding road up, you just knew it was built for military purposes as no one in a passive civil mind would have tried to punch a road up those angles and then maintain them.

Did I mention that guard rails are for the weak and Slovenia is not weak. To make it even more "fun" there were a few tunnels that were ahead of their time, no lights so no lighting carbon footprint, wearing sunglasses was a huge mistake and as quickly as I could get them off, we had a near 90 degree bend in the tunnel just to exercise the spinchter.

On our last night, we were told that we had done 41 memorable passes (most over 2000m) plus a huge number of lesser height passes and this doesn't count Mangart as its a return trip and not technically a pass.

The bike records info, so 3019km,6647 turns registered, 9128 gear changes, 8187 front brake applications and 110 rear brake. Might explain why my left shoulder is very tired and sore. I am still to find out at what lean angle the bike registered as turn because 6647 doesn't sound a lot when I recall how many corners there were on each pass.


